Cultivate Food Forum: A success story of exemplary partnerships

On February 23rd, CHARP hosted the Cultivate Food Forum in partnership with WTVI, Chipotle and UNC Charlotte Urban Educators for Change. Residents from four CHARP neighborhoods participated in the event that was held at the WTVI station, Charlotte's local PBS channel. The student group Urban Educators for Change provided a healthy eating program for youth and childcare for attendees to enable widespread participation. Representatives from Chipotle not only supplied burritos with fresh ingredients for dinner to the 66 total participants, but also discussed what it means to serve "food with integrity." Whenever possible, Chipotle sources food locally and uses antibiotic and hormone free animal products to insure the freshest, healthiest ingredients. (continued)

The food forum evolved conceptually through AmeriCorps Pamela Pate's VISTA work plan that dictates that a major portion of her service at UNC Charlotte must focus on issues surrounding food security and the people that are adversely impacted by the absence of food security. The Windy Ridge neighborhood in west Charlotte, like many of CHARP's partner neighborhoods, where Pam is a CHARP liaison, is defined as a food dessert, meaning that residents have little access to fresh healthy foods. Pam developed the food forum in response to this situation and identified the following three objectives to help guide the planning process for the food forum: 1) to bring residents

out of their neighborhoods and into the larger community; 2) to provide residents with an opportunity to meet other Charlotte residents that are facing similar food security challenges; and 3) to celebrate the residents while learning more about healthy eating and what Charlotte has to offer.

Pam had the good fortune of meeting Beverly Dorn-Steele at a Crossroads Charlotte event when they were assigned to a group together. Beverly is the Community Outreach and Education Coordinator for WTVI. Shortly after that first encounter, Pam, who has a background in television, setup a meeting with Beverly to discuss how they could make the food forum into a larger event.

Working closely with Windy Ridge HOA residents, undergraduate students from Dr. Janni Sorensen's Social Inequality and Planning class, Pam was able to leverage additional internal and external resources to make the food forum an outstanding success. For six weeks everyone worked together as a team to develop the food forum concept. CHARP liaisons also contributed to the success of the event and performed outreach in their respective communities resulting in a well-attended event.

Also present at the event was Dr. Elizabeth Racine, from UNC Charlotte, who presented her research on food deserts in Charlotte. The evening also included break-out sessions that allowed participants to network with residents from other neighborhoods while discussing the food security issues they face.

Thanks to WTVI, all food forum attendees received copies of the Sesame Street DVD, Food for Thought. CHARP also provided an assortment of kitchenware that was given away as prizes. Children received exciting grab bags, a children's cookbook and a variety of healthy snacks. The success of this event is a precedent for CHARP to continue! Thanks to all of those that helped.

Reid Park

Spring has blossomed in Reid Park and exciting things are occurring. First, Reid Park has been selected to receive a KaBOOM! Playground. KabOOM! works with funders and communities to create play spaces in communities that are lacking adequate recreation space for children. One benefit of the KaBOOM! model is that the community plans, designs, and with the help of community and funder volunteers, builds the playground itself. The build day for the playground is October 13, 2012.

The neighborhood association is currently focused on coordinating outreach and fundraising efforts for KaBOOM! and also on increasing neighborhood participation. Also, the community is engaged in extensive beautification projects. Many wooded areas in Reid Park have been affected by illegal dumping of waste from outsiders but, recently, neighborhood residents have responded by reclaiming their space through two major cleanup events. The second illegal dumping cleanup will be on April 28, 2012 and will coincide with the Great American Cleanup.

The neighborhood association is also in the process of closing out their grant. The new lawn grant funds have arrived, and now the fun begins as we reach out to those in the community who need yard work completed.
