

Neighborhood Change: Introduction

 We used to have great stores, parks, beautiful homes, neighborhood schools, and higher homeownership in our neighborhoods.

 Our main purpose is to bring back those things that made our neighborhoods so special

Neighborhood Change: Local Businesses

- How can neighborhood businesses and corporations be more involved in our neighborhoods?
 - We're interested in creating an atmosphere where businesses can form reciprocal partnerships with our neighborhoods
 - There are smaller businesses and larger ones.
 What types of strategies can be used to engage these different types to create new partnerships?

Neighborhood Change: Retail

- How can neighborhoods attract more neighborhood- and family-oriented businesses to our neighborhoods?
 - No banks
 - No full-service grocery
- What can we do to make our neighborhoods attractive to businesses so that they will locate in our neighborhoods?
- What can we do to convince business that we are viable communities?

Neighborhood Change: Affordable Housing

- What does affordable housing mean in Charlotte?
- How is affordable housing distributed and what decisions determine where it is placed and concentrated?
- What are the existing affordable housing policies in Charlotte?
 - What are the perceptions of affordable housing in Charlotte?

Neighborhood Change: Gentrification, Revitalization and Displacement

 We want to improve our neighborhoods but how do make staying in place affordable?

 How do we avoid being displaced by positive change in our neighborhoods?

Neighborhood Change: Closing Comments

- Our taxes are increasing but rather than gain new parks and facilities, we have lost them over time.
- These are the questions we have and figuring out the answers can help us better understand our neighborhood and how to successfully improve quality of life for all of us

Spatial Justice: Introduction

- Introduction of research theme

Spatial Justice: Distribution of Amenities and Disamenities

- Who gets what: where, when, and how?
 - Why do certain areas receive better quality parks and infrastructure over others?
 - Is it tied to political power?
- How do unattractive land uses end up in our neighborhoods?
 - What can be done?

Spatial Justice

 Why are certain land uses subsidized but neighborhoods do not have access to the most basic retail?

Empowerment and Citizen Rights:Introduction

- What can individuals do to influence neighborhood outcomes?
 - Who makes the decisions?
 - Can we become part of the political process?
- How can neighborhoods access or accrue the power to influence the decisions made about their community?

 - How does the Charlotte context impact these potential partnerships?

- How can conditions in our neighborhoods and Charlotte be altered to decrease crime?
 - Physical
 - Social
 - Support services
 - Reaching out to youth
 - Economic
 - Job opportunities
- What hands-on strategies can we use to encourage people to be more active in making our neighborhoods safe?
 - What higher level (city, county, state, federal) resources can we use to do this?

- Does the label of "challenged" or "bad side of town" become a self-fulfilling prophecy?
 - How does perception of a place influence what happens to that place?
 - How do we overcome these labels?
- Labels stick and carry a lot of weight
 - It is hard to overcome these bad names without changing the name AND conditions around the place that is named

- How can we combat the attitude of 'no snitching' that has become so prevalent in our society?
 - Where did this attitude come from and how does it hurt our communities?
- The label 'snitch' turns people off
 - How can protecting your neighborhood and reporting crime be reframed?
 - How can we encourage positive behavior and care for the neighborhood?

- Closing Comments
 - We want to encourage positive behavior and pride in our neighborhood to reduce crime
 - We want to find ways for people to not feel trapped
 - How do we support people in our neighborhoods and let them know we support them in keeping our neighborhoods safe?
